

Father Jim's Thoughts for the week ...



Entering into time in prayer is much like straightening up your room

Have you ever noticed how easily the counter in your kitchen or your desktop at work gathers clutter throughout the day? Between plates and glasses, mail and papers, it takes some organizing everyday to get things back in order. This physical reality is the same in the interior life. The difference is that the interior life is much easier to ignore.

When you enter into time in prayer, what you are doing is cleaning a space. You are clearing out a space with a spiritual broom so to speak. Often, it doesn't feel good for a few minutes. If feels tense. We have to remember that this is the kind of tension we have to embrace. This tension comes from earthly attachments. Once the space is clear (5-10 mins after starting prayer) you can enter into the experience of prayer. The tension will settle, and the fruits of clarity and illumination will come. This is why discipline always precedes the fruits of prayer. The next time you feel tense about the need to pray, remember to get that spiritual broom out, harness the gift of discipline, enter into a quiet space, and simply begin to pray! Try not to let a day go by without cleaning your interior space!



Children's Liturgy of the Word Corner



Thirty-second Sunday in Ordinary Time: Wisdom 6:12-16; Psalm 63; Matthew 25:1-13

Prayer of the Day: Lord God, you speak to us in our hearts and one day will call us to live with you forever. Do not let us be deaf to your voice nor let your final call take us by surprise. With your help, may we keep on praying every day. And, guided by your Holy Spirit, may we learn how to choose the right things to do and avoid the bad. We make this prayer to you through Jesus, your Son, who lives with you forever and ever.

Wisdom is what the readings focus on this week, but what is wisdom? Its definition is :quality of having knowledge and good judgment, quality of being wise". The first reading says wisdom is wonderful and helps people know what is good and right. In Matthew's Gospel reading, he talks about the wise and foolish bridesmaids. It's talks about 10 bridesmaids waiting for the groom to get the bride and take her to the wedding feast. In those days the groom came to bride's house to take her in procession to his house where the wedding feast would take place. In this story the groom is very late and not all of the bridesmaids had enough oil for the lamps. So they left to get more. In the story it says, "the door was already locked" and they could not be let in.

In those days, doors were locked with wooden bars so it was not easy to open them once closed. Even though this story is about a wedding feast, Jesus tells us to "Always be ready, for you do not know when the Lord will come!" In short, this means we need to lead a good and prayerful life so when it is our time to go to heaven, we are ready and will be met by Jesus. Most of us don't think about that when we are young, but if we follow what Jesus has told us to do, we should all be ready whenever our time may be.

GOSPEL MEDITATION - November 12, 2023 32nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

Lately I've been enjoying the deep meaning of Eastern icons. I love how they express a tapestry of meaning in a way that can surpass the written or spoken word. Today's parable of the ten virgins from Jesus is a good example. Try googling "wise and foolish virgins icon" and you'll see an image of how our Christ meets our heart's deepest needs if we attend to him with the proper attitude.

I'm serious. Take a moment to google and look at it. See how it depicts the risen Jesus behind a closed door with the five wise virgins with lighted lamps. He gazes with them toward the five foolish and lamp-less virgins, symbolizing the outward looking of divine love for the lost. Moreover, the wedding feast is no ordinary one. It takes place in a walled city and garden, indicating it's a new Jerusalem and a return to Eden. The table isn't typical, either. It's a Eucharistic feast. Now we see that the door in Jesus' parable is the way into the church, where Christ is the new light burning amidst the dark midnight of this world.

The richness continues. We notice, too, that the foolish virgins look *exactly* the same as the wise ones in their clothes, hair, and expressions. The only difference is they departed to buy oil and now they are sadly excluded. We often act like consumers in the marketplace to fulfill our need for love and mercy. We'll *always* end up disappointed if we shop around. Jesus sums up the moral of the story this way: "Watch therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour." Watch, remain, don't spiritually shop. It is *always* better to quietly remain close to the Eucharistic community of the Church, even if we feel like our oil has run out. This week let's consider placing the icon of the wise and foolish virgins on our phone lock screen or computer desktop to help us remember to stay close to him, especially when life feels dark.
